Advisory Committee on Disability Issues (ACDI)

Established in 1992

Purpose: to advise City Council and all City Departments on issues related to persons with physical, developmental and mental health disabilities. A secondary purpose is to advocate on behalf of persons with disabilities to other authorities that formulate policies and/or offer programs that impact people with disabilities. The ACDI recognizes both visible and invisible disabilities.

Begin with the end in mind: recruitment

Get the right people at the table

- People able to represent the needs of all people with disabilities
- Team players, willing to work with city staff
- 7 of 9 members must self-identify as having a disability



ACDI's Top Achievement

Building internal support and recognition for accessibility and inclusion for people with disabilities.

- Build relationships

Working with Staff

Determine and address the barrier (real or imagined)

- Physical barriers
- Fear based barriers
 - Unknown other
 - Saying/doing the wrong thing
- Other (budget, not connected to their goals)
- Make it safe for staff to tell you what they need to


How does Medicine Hat Compare?

Audit Recommendation Excerpt

Accessible Parking	1.	Consider adding 2 marked accessible parking spaces in the lower parking lot. Each stall should be a minimum of 2,400 mm wide with an access aisle of the same width (2,400 mm) between the two accessible stalls.	Low
Barrier Free Path of Travel	1.	Consider reducing the transition from the roadway to the trail so that it does not exceed 13 mm.	Medium
Barrier Free Path of Travel	1.	Consider leveling any height differences in the pavers that exceed 13 mm.	Medium
Entrance	1.	Reduce the threshold to 13 mm or less.	High
Entrance	1.	Consider replacing the door with a lighter door that can be operated with a lever handle requiring no more than 38 Newton.	High
Entrance	1.	Consider including a window in the doors so those leaving the building can check to see that the door swing area is clear.	Medium
Men's Washroom	1.	Increase door width to the extent possible to compensate for the narrow hallway width.	High
Men's Washroom	1.	Replace the existing angled grab bar with an L-shaped grab bar with a 60 degree bend lining up with the front of the toilet. The midpoint of the grab bar should sit 300-330 mm above the height of the toilet seat.	High


