



Prompting Preparedness

Routine preparedness messages to build capacity for risk reduction education in Alberta

Prompting Preparedness is a regular email to help community leaders champion preparedness at the local level. Emails are typically sent each week to encourage preparedness habits all year long. The frequency of emails will change when there is increased risk, and motivation to take preparedness actions.

Feel free to copy and paste the message below on your communications channels. Be sure to include full URLs when posting on to social media.

Don't forget to tailor the message to your local context as needed. You can post the message as is, or you can include your own images and share local stories to make the message more meaningful.

Be prepared by planning ahead:

- -If you must drive, check road conditions beforehand by downloading the 511 Alberta app or visiting the website.
- -Stock your vehicle emergency kit with winter supplies like warm clothing, a shovel and a pair of boots.
- -Refill essentials earlier than usual, such as prescriptions and vehicles; and gather supplies to keep you safe and comfortable.


Look for Teaching Moments

- Increased risk literacy encourages risk reduction behaviour






