About Resolutions

Alberta Municipalities (ABmunis) conducts an annual resolutions process that enables member municipalities to identify and prioritize common issues and solutions and give direction to Alberta Municipalities' Board of Directors to advocate to the federal and provincial governments on members' behalf.

This process includes a resolutions session at ABmunis' annual Convention where Regular Members vote on submitted resolutions. When members adopt a resolution, ABmunis takes action to develop and implement an advocacy strategy for each resolution.

Given the scope, complexity, and volume of issues facing municipalities, ABmunis uses a [prioritization framework](#) to determine the degree of resources that are invested in advocacy for each resolution.

On April 25, 2024, the Minister of Health announced a signed deal with the Nurse Practitioners Association of Alberta for the launch of a new Nurse Practitioner Primary Care Program. This initiative empowers Nurse Practitioners (NPs) to work independently, expanding their role in primary care clinics. Under this program, NPs will receive compensation based on patient panel size and care hours, as well as additional incentives for NPs who choose to serve rural and underserved communities</p> <p>ABmunis' Rating of the Government's Response Intent met - further action will be taken at a low level of engagement.</p> <p>ABmunis' Notes and Actions Although we have not received a formal response from the Minister of Health, we have seen significant positive movement from both the Nurse Practitioners Association of Alberta and the Ministry in coming to an</p>

The results indicated that 70% of Albertans were not supportive. In the spring 2024 legislative session, the Government of Alberta passed Bill 20, the Municipal Affairs Statutes Amendment Act, 2024, which made numerous changes to the LAEA including the ability for municipal political parties to operate in the Calgary and Edmonton municipal elections in 2025. In addition, Bill 20 made several changes to donation limits and enabled corporations and unions to donate to candidates. In October 2024, the province released the new Expense Limits Regulation, which provides an unfair financial advantage for candidates who run under a political party.</p> <p>ABmunis' Rating of the Government's Response Intent not met – further action will be taken at a high level of engagement.</p> <p>ABmunis' Notes and Actions ABmunis actions on this issue have included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Contracted Janet Brown Opinion Research to poll Albertans in August 2023, which confirmed that 68% were opposed.

Municipalities are encouraged to work with library boards to negotiate cost-sharing arrangements...but these agreements are not enabled under ICF provisions.”</p> <p>ABmunis' Rating of the Government's Response</p> <p>Intent not met – further action will be taken at a low level of engagement.
